I Introduction

The Institute of Development Studies Kolkata (IDSK) was established in 2002 under the provisions of West Bengal Societies Act XXVI of 1961 in pursuance of the recommendations of a committee set up by the West Bengal Council of Higher Education. Professor Irfan Habib was nominated as the first President and Professor Amiya Kumar Bagchi was elected as the first Director cum Secretary of the Institute.

The objectives of the IDSK include several dimensions. First of all, it is to help understand the process of socio-economic transformation and development in West Bengal and the eastern region as well as in other parts of the country and abroad. For this basic purpose, it has to establish the highest standards of research by paying adequate attention to the appropriate empirical, theoretical and methodological issues. It is envisaged that the IDSK will facilitate interaction among various disciplines within social sciences with a view to conceptualizing different aspects of socio-economic transformation and development. The IDSK will continually explore the possibility of discourse between social sciences and other sciences, including technology- oriented disciplines. With the help of research findings, it will focus on the problems of formulating the required socio-economic policies. The IDSK will also train future researchers, some of whom may acquire M.phil. or Ph.D. degrees. It will help other civil society organizations in training, their key personnel who will implement their programmes. In addition to these goals, the IDSK may undertake any other academic activity which expedites the fulfillment of the above objectives.

The University of Calcutta provided space for the Institute at its Alipore Campus. The Institute moved into its new premises on 1st August, 2002. Dr. Ramkrishna Chatterjee, Assistant Secretary, helped the Director in the task of setting up and administration of the Institute. Following the usual procedures of recruitment, two Professors, three Associate Professors, one Research Coordinator and four Research Fellows have joined the Institute of Development Studies Kolkata.

II Activities of the Institute¹

A. Research Programmes:

i. Project on literacy and primary education in West Bengal

The Institute launched a research programme on "Literacy and Primary Education in West Bengal" with the aim of constituting a research group that would inquire intensively into both the micro and macro aspects of achievement of universal literacy and elimination of the phenomenon of children of school-going age not attending school. A conceptual flier setting out some of the major obstacles faced while trying to attain these objectives was printed with the help of leading experts in the field, including Professor Prabhat Datta and Dr. Dipankar Sinha of the Department of Political Science, Calcutta University and Professor Raghabendra Chattopadhyay of the Indian Institute of Management, Calcutta. This flier was circulated to all the colleges of West Bengal, to the relevant departments of the universities of West Bengal and also to the Bangiya Saksharata Samiti, offices of the District Magistrates and Zilla Sabhadhipatis and NGOs working in the field of education and literacy in West Bengal. The experts helped screen the research proposals and twenty proposals were intensively discussed in a workshop held on 13 and 14 December, 2002. On the basis of the suggestions made by the experts, the researchers revised their proposals and another workshop was held on 15 January, 2003. After a final workshop held on 26 July, 2003, and further scrutiny by experts, a set of ten papers has been chosen for inclusion in a volume to be prepared on the basis of further studies to be conducted by the Institute.

ii. Project on health, nutrition and public policies in West Bengal

With the help of Dr. Dilip Mahalanabis, a pioneer in oral rehydration therapy, Dr. Satish Agnihotri, an expert on determinants of women's survival rates and Dr. Krishna Soman of the Institute of Development Studies Kolkata, a flier was prepared on the issues of health, nutrition and public policies in West Bengal. Advertisements were put out in the *Economic and Political Weekly* asking for proposals on the issues set out in the flier. The flier was circulated among persons known to be working on those issues. Sixty-eight applications were received from interested researchers. After short listing and screening through a one-day workshop on 31 January, 2004, ten researchers were selected by Dr. Krishna Soman and the

Director with the help of Dr. Mahalanabis and Dr. Amitava Sen. The project has begun from 1 March and will continue till 31 August 2004.

B. National Seminar

On 15 and 16 October, 2003, a national seminar in collaboration with the Department of History, Calcutta University was held under its auspices on 'Public Health in India: Colonial and post-colonial experience'. The Indian Council of Social Science Research supported the seminar with financial help. Eminent historians and specialists in the area of health studies participating in the seminar included Dr. Dilip Mahalanabis (Honorary Senior Fellow of the Institute of Development Studies Kolkata and recipient of Pollin Award 2002 for oral rehydration therapy), Professor R. Radhakrishna (Director, Indira Gandhi Institute of Development Research, Mumbai), Professor Imrana Qadeer (Jawaharlal Nehru University), Dr. C. Sathyamala (Visiting Professor, Jawaharlal Nehru University, Dr. Achintya Datta (Burdwan University) and Professor Basudeb Chattopadhyay (Calcutta University). A summary report of the proceedings of the seminars, authored by Drs. Krishna Soman and Subhoranjan Dasgupta of the IDSK was published under the heading, 'Public health: Historical experience', in the Economic and Political Weekly, 22 November 2003. It is planned to publish a selection of the papers, which have been finalized by the authors.

C. Workshops

On 17 and 18 October 2003, the Institute organized a workshop on 'Teaching of Development Economics' in collaboration with the Department of Economics, Calcutta University. More than fifty college and university teachers attended the workshop. The speakers at the workshop included Professor R. Radhakrishna (Director, Indira Gandhi Institute of Development Research), Professor Prabhat Patnaik (Jawaharlal Nehru University), Professor Asim Dasgupta (Finance Minister, Government of West Bengal), Professor V.K. Ramachandran (Indian Statistical Institute), Professor Sudip Chaudhuri (Indian Institute of Management Calcutta) and Professor Amiya Kumar Bagchi (Director, IDSK). A 'Network of Development Economics' with Professor Ishita Mukhopadhyay as coordinator, was launched at the workshop.

D. Internal Seminars

The Institute conducts a seminar series in which members of the faculty present their research findings. It is planned to have regular workshops at which the Research Fellows will report their programmes.

III Collaboration with other organizations

a. MOU with NISTADS, New Delhi

The Institute has signed a Memorandum of Understanding with the National Institute of Science, Technology and Development Studies, New Delhi.

b. Research Project funded by Rosa Luxemburg Foundation, Berlin

The IDSK signed an agreement with the Rosa Luxemburg Foundation, Berlin on 11 March 2004. According to the agreement, IDSK as the nodal centre, will implement a three year long research project entitled 'Women and Media in the Context of Contemporary Globalisation'. Four leading centres of gender studies – School of Women's Studies, Jadavpur University, School of Women's Studies, Bhubaneswar and Institute of Women's Studies, Lucknow University, Lucknow have been invited to join as partner institutes in this programme.

IV Library

The library of the IDSK started functioning a year ago. It has already accumulated more than eight hundred titles of books .It subscribes to twenty eight foreign journals, and eighteen Indian journals in the fields of education, public health, economics, gender studies, history, finance, sociology, labour studies and other fields of social sciences relevant to Institute's research areas including literary studies. Besides it already has a considerable collection of reports, conference papers and proceedings and other primary sources of information related to IDSK's research.

The library has recently received as gift from Dr. Madhumita Roy of Tufts University, a valuable collection of books belonging to the Late Michael Sprinker. The library has also acquired books and journals from other friends of the IDSK.

The library is on the way to acquiring e-journals and e-books and a number of digital materials.
